Grounding Prayer

(Take a deep breath, center yourself within the love of God) God, You are present, may I be transformed by this encounter.

Opening Prayer:

Forgive us when we fail, and give us a glimpse of your radiance so that we may learn, grow, and abide in you. Amen.

Prayer of Illumination:

O God of the ages:

As I open the scriptures this day, let me take heart, for you are calling me. As I seek your will for me, free my spirit to receive the truths that you have for me today. Amen.

A Reading from the Gospel of Mark 1:14-20

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." And immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.

A Short Reflection by Rev. Linda Buchanan:

Here we are at the beginning of a new year, Praise God! Generations of God's people have marked this time of Epiphany by reflecting on our call to follow Christ, trusting that we are beloved children of God. This season calls us to live out the hope within Christmas, by shining the Light of Christ wherever we go. I have a favorite Epiphany hymn, and this year I was given new insight that has illuminated my love of this hymn. I share with you a poem written by the Rev. Dr. Howard Thurman, a theologian of the civil rights movement. May these words dance in your spirit bringing you new epiphanies of God's abundant love.

The Work of Christmas by Howard Thurman

When the song of the angels is stilled, When the star in the sky is gone, When the kings and princes are home, When the shepherds are back with their flock,

The work of Christmas begins:

To find the lost,

To heal the broken,

To feed the hungry,

To release the prisoner,

To rebuild the nations,

To bring peace among others,

To make music in the heart.

Prayers of the People:

I pray using the words Jesus gave to his disciples;

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be your Name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses,

as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Blessing & Commissioning

We are the light and love of God! Let us go out into the world and challenge its struggle with the good news that God's love is for all! Through our witness, may we spark the fire of God in others. Amen.

Prayer of Illumination:

As we come to hear scripture today, let us open ourselves that we might experience the intention the Divine Creator has called us to fulfill and act upon. Amen.

A Reading from the Hebrew Book of Psalms 111

Praise the Lord!

I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart, in the company of the upright, in the congregation.

Great are the works of the Lord, studied by all who delight in them.

Full of honor and majesty is God's work,

and God's righteousness endures forever. God has gained renown by God's wonderful deeds;

the Lord is gracious and merciful.

God provides food for those who fear God; God is ever mindful of God's covenant.

God has shown God's people the power of God's works, in giving them the heritage of the nations.

The works of God's hands are faithful and just; all God's precepts are trustworthy.

They are established forever and ever,

to be performed with faithfulness and uprightness.

God sent redemption to God's people;

Personal Reflection:

May the words of this Psalm bring you comfort and conviction. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of Wisdom." I wonder if perhaps the 'fear of God' that is 'the beginning of wisdom' is in part the willingness to move through our fears and discover God reflected in others- especially those most marginalized, particularly since we are the only "Jesus" many people will ever experience. May we trust that God is with us, God will keep promises and uphold the covenant; our part is to love others so they will know of God's love.
